My Summer Camp Experience

When I was 13 years old and I went to an American summer camp, in Tamarack, Michigan, for three weeks. It was also my first encounter with American Jewry.

The concept of a summer camp in the United States is very different from a summer camp in Israel. Camps in the USA tend to run longer, include outdoor recreation such as a pool or lake, and the kids sleep in cabins with bed. Camps in Israel have kids sleeping in the middle of the forest on beds that they have built from sticks. Additionally, the educational content that each country teaches is completely different. Camps in Israel base their camp on a yearly theme, while camps in the US often change themes weekly. Most interesting is that summer camps in Israel often do not discuss Judaism and Israel, while Israel was a major theme when I attended the Jewish summer camp in Michigan.

When I attended camp in the USA, I was first exposed to Judaism that was very different from the Judaism I knew in Israel. All the campers sat together at the

Kabbalat Shabbat, in front of a beautiful lake, boys and girls dressed in white, singing together with the Rabbi as he played the guitar. We sang songs and chants that we learned during the week in Hebrew with many American accents added! I will forever remember the feeling of that Sabbath at summer camp in Michigan.

After that summer in America, I realized that the experience I had at Jewish summer camp was unique for a girl from Israel and it made me desire to explore more Jewish life outside of Israel. When I arrived in Tulsa I was happy to learn that there is a summer camp here, Camp Shalom, and although it is a day camp, the traditions, contents, and conditions are very similar. This year will be my second summer participating at Camp Shalom, connecting the children to Israel and Judaism through games, arts and crafts, songs, conversations, and weekly Shabbat services. Camp Shalom is an exciting time at the CSJCC! The building is alive with activity and smiling, young faces eager to be here and have fun, while also learning a little about Judaism.

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



Jason grew up in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He attended Camp Shalom when the campus was just a swimming pool and some woods! He is a graduate of Jenks High School and went on to play soccer at Yale University. During his freshman year in college, Jason and his roommate, Matt Wallach came up with the idea to do a summer camp circuit

together in each of their hometowns (Tulsa and Philadelphia). "We thought it would be neat to run a camp together at the JCC," said Jason Neidell.

At that moment, neither Jason nor Matt would have imagined their idea would bloom into a thirty-year soccer program.

Some of Jason's favorite memories are not really memories but a collection of relationships that mean the world to him. Younger campers who have grown up and come back as staff, like current staff Shrey Kathuria. And friendships that have endured like the one with Martha Kelley, who coached at Soccer Magic many moons ago before becoming the JCC Director.

I asked Jason what keeps him coming back to Tulsa each summer. "It's fun to return to a community to give back, especially one that provided so much for me growing up. I literally grew up at the JCC pool and roaming the halls of the community center. We would bring lots of friends and play indoor soccer in the gym. I was even a lifeguard for several years in the summer. So many fond memories!"

"Soccer Magic has been a staple since 1991, and it's been a privilege to watch so many young people go through the camp over the years. I've watched so many grow up before my eyes, going from campers to counselors to adults. It's been a fun ride" said Jason.

Because of Jason and Matt's vision and dedication to Soccer Magic, we can proudly say this is one of the CSJCC's longest running programs and we don't plan on stopping anytime soon!

Holocaust Art Touches Lives by NANCY PETTUS, DIRECTOR OF HOLOCAUST EDUCATION

I've seen countless pieces of Holocaust-inspired art in my nearly 30 years in Holocaust education, but this year a piece brought tears to my eyes. A child, maybe a boy, maybe a girl, stands in the midst of a death camp's darkness. Sad eyes peer warily from an emaciated face, searching for rescue that will never come. Helpless hands hang from an adult-sized camp uniform shirt that fits like a dress. One wonders what this child did to deserve the fate that we know was eventual death. The answer is Nothing. Nothing but being Jewish in a country that was obsessed with Aryan perfection.

The artist, Abraham Garcia, a senior from Edison Preparatory HS, hand-delivered this masterpiece, which I learned took him nearly 100 hours to create. I was nearly speechless. What passion, grief, research, and focus it took to stay the task and produce a work of art that spoke volumes of the 1.5 million children who were murdered in the Holocaust.

Please enjoy the winners and honorable mention of the 2022 Yom HaShoah Art Contest. May their thoughtful pieces touch you, teach you, and inspire you to never forget the lessons of the Holocaust.

You are invited to visit our student art exhibit which will be in the Sharna Newman Education Gallery within the Sherwin Miller Jewish Museum of Art, 2021 E. 71st St. until June 6. There is no admission to view the exhibit.

Muslim Albanians Who Rescued Jews During the Holocaust

In 1933, Albania, a small and mountainous country on

the southeast coast of the Balkan peninsula, was home to a population of 803,000. Of those only two hundred were Jews. After Hitler's rise to power many Jews found refuge in Albania. No accurate figures exist regarding their number; however, different sources estimate that 600-1,800 Jewish refugees entered that country from Germany, Austria, Serbia, Greece and Yugoslavia, in the hopes to continue on to the Land of Israel or other places of refuge. The remarkable assistance afforded to the Jews was grounded in Besa, a code of honor, which still today serves as the highest ethical code in the country. Besa means literally "to keep the promise." One who acts according to Besa is someone who keeps his word, someone to whom one can trust one's life and the lives of one's family.

Following his studies at the American Institute of Chicago and the Chicago Academy of Arts, Raymond

Katz was employed by Balaban and Katz Theater Corporation to decorate movie palaces. His mural commission, *Ten Commandments* at Chicago's Century of Progress exhibition in 1933 was based on the Hebrew alphabet. Subsequent murals and stained-glass window designs commissioned by synagogues throughout America display symbolic images interpretive of Jewish traditions.




Next Year in Jerusalem The Western Wall Through Art Exhibit




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School Is Out For Summer!

This year has been amazing—returning to Tulsa, laying down roots, and serving as The Flo & Morris Mizel Jewish Community Day School's Executive Director. One of the reasons I love Mizel JCDS is our teachers. They are dedicated, caring, and exceptional! They make sure each child reaches their potential and beyond. I am proud to share the wonderful experiences this year brought for our students.

Mizel students had numerous opportunities for enrichment activities involving yoga, socialemotional learning, physical education, art, music, and STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) to name a few. Our students are also becoming digital experts through the Hebrew program with the skilled guidance of Morah Alin Avitan.

We had very successful events including the annual Thanksgiving Luncheon, family Shabbats, Purim, Passover, and Yom Ha'azmaut celebrations. We also managed to incorporate field trips to the Pumpkin Patch, Discovery Lab, and the Tulsa Glass Glassblowing School. Our students loved learning outside the classroom as well as bringing in outside organizations including the Tulsa Zoo, Tulsa Opera, and others.

Our biggest program addition was creating and implementing the "Mizel Meal Makers." Students worked with a chef to create snacks and meals which aligned with their classroom curriculum and created meaningful learning experiences while satisfying their hungry tummies. Recently, our first and second graders created their own "restaurant" and served their families and special guests a four-course meal. One of the guests attending said, "I stopped by the Mizel Meal Makers restaurant for a quick bite. The staff was incredibly welcoming and very attentive. As soon as I sat down, I was serenaded, then promptly handed an appetizer. The homemade cheese was delicious! The salad was fresh and zingy. The main course (moussaka) was cooked to absolute perfection. Dessert rounded out the meal delightfully!" This successful hands-on cooking program only began in January and I cannot wait to see what next year's full year cooking classes for all-ages will bring!

In our pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classes, students ended the year with "Little Outdoor Explorers" classes. They worked on skills encompassing focus, creativity, STEAM, teamwork, motor skills, literacy, and more. Students began in the spring making Stone Soup for the trees and animals. It was wonderful to use beautiful Liberator's Park to explore nature and art for these experiential handson learning exercises. Our students fell in love with bird watching and making their own nests. They also made "nature feasts" out of mud to create nature's version of mud pies, cupcakes, and cakes. Having permission to get dirty and play in the mud made "Little Outdoor Explorers" a huge hit!

Next school year we are growing! Although this year, enrollment was to 2nd grade, currently our Fall 2022 enrollment includes up to 4th grade. We hope our staff, students, and families have a safe and fun summer and look forward to welcoming everyone back this fall.



President's Report - Ed Sherman



2021 was a year of new beginnings with many speed bumps and successes along the way. In the spring our Executive Director and the Chief Financial Officer retired after serving 10 and 19 years respectively. They were very helpful in getting their successors acclimated to their jobs, for which we are very thankful. Aida Nozick, Executive Director and Joy Platt, Chief Financial Officer, were able to hit the ground running.

The pandemic continued to create its own set of challenges – masks or no masks, vaccines or not, use of various facilities and camp attendance limits. There were also limits on the number of attendees at certain events as well as the actual scheduling of those events. Our staff did an excellent job of maintaining the necessary controls. I am sure we all will be happy when we are able to return to more normal times.

To stay up to date with technology and use the tools that are available to us for communications, we installed a quality system to accommodate virtual communications. This allows us to continue quality programming and hybrid meetings.

Although the pandemic required reduced enrollment, we had a very safe and successful summer camp program. We look forward to repeating that success this Summer

Our annual campaign was a success and gives us a better opportunity to serve our community. We sincerely thank all of our contributors, volunteers, and terrific staff.

Your Board of Directors has approved a very aggressive capital improvements spending program. Some of those improvements have already been completed while others are scheduled for later in the year. You should notice lighting improvements, as all general lighting in the building has been converted to LED. When the pool opens in May, there will be a new diving board and slide and the renovated restrooms will be operational.

The past years' successes set the stage for another year of moving forward. The theme for 2022 is "United Jewish Tulsa", a time when we work together as one, allowing us to continue to flourish as one strong Jewish community.

The mission of the Charles Schusterman Jewish Community Center is to provide a focal point for activities, education, culture, and assembly for the Tulsa Jewish community, to provide cultural outreach to the greater Tulsa community and to act as a Jewish resource to the Tulsa community. Last year continued to be challenging navigating the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. The CSJCC continued to follow local health and safety guidelines and effectively remained open for members to exercise and safely gather. Camp Shalom successfully returned in a limited capacity after remaining closed in 2020.

Boasting the largest collection of Judaica in the Southwest, The Sherwin Miller Museum of Jewish Art offers a glimpse into the history and traditions of the Jewish people. Through the lens of both fine art and artifacts, the collection provides a testament and tribute to the resiliency of the Jewish people and those who seek to learn more about them.

The mission of the Flo and Morris Mizel Jewish Day School, founded as Heritage Academy in 1975, is to provide an outstanding educational program for pre-Kthrough 5th grade students. Rooted in Jewish traditions and values, the general studies and Judaic studies curricula fosters critical thinking, collaboration, character and compassion. As a Jewish Day School, Mizel JCDS is a home to a diverse community of students: Jewish, Interfaith, and other backgrounds.





During the 2021-22 school year, Mizel focused on growing its early childhood grades, prekindergarten — 2nd grade. We started the year out with 32 students, over 65% Jewish.



New opportunities for students and families were added including yoga, social-emotional learning, and STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) enrichment activities.







The Jewish Maiden (form) \odot

da Rosenthal was born Ida Kahanovich on January 9, 1886, in Rakov, Belarus as the eldest of four girls and three boys of Abraham Akiva Kahanovitch (1864-1940) and Sarah Shapiro Kahanovitch (1864-1945). At the age of 16 she first moved to Warsaw, Poland where she worked as a dressmaker while studying mathematics and Russian in the evenings. On April 25, 1905, at the age of 19, she followed her fiancé William Wolf Rosenthal (1882-1958) the son of Solomon and Sara Botwinick Rosenthal, who was also born and raised in Rakov, Belarus to the United States and arrived on the SS Statendam as Itle Kahanowitz. Upon arrival, she Americanized her name to Cohen. She married Rosenthal (a dress wholesaler and dress manufacturer, amateur sculptor, and designer), on June 10, 1906, and they eventually had two children: Lewis Rosenthal (1907–1930) and Beatrice Rosenthal Coleman (1916-1990)

With little money in her pocket, she bought herself a Singer sewing machine (see TJR July 2021-The Jewish Sewing Machine Lothario) on the installment plan and began working as an independent seamstress establishing a small dressmaker's shop in Hoboken, New Jersey.

Ida's sewing business boomed during World War I, and in 1919, she and her husband, along with business partner, Englishwoman Enid Bisset moved the shop to New York City and in 1921, they opened up a custom dress shop on Manhattan's fashionable West 57th Street called Enid Frocks. The popular "flapper" style of the day demanded a flat-chested look, which women achieved by wearing uncomfortable bandeaux. The Rosenthal's disliked the way their dresses fit women with artificially flat chests, and so they developed a new undergarment that would support, conform, and accentuate a woman's natural figure... two cups connected by shoulder straps and a band that fastened in the back. At first, the partners simply gave the new bras away with each dress they sold. As the popularity of their new undergarment grew, however, they gave up dressmaking altogether and focused exclusively on producing and selling bras. To distinguish their product from the "boyish form" bandeaux, they called and registered their new garment as "Maiden Form."


In 1925, the Enid Manufacturing Company was incorporated, and the first Maidenform plant was opened in Bayonne, New Jersey to focus solely on their most popular product, brassieres (although the company later produced lingerie and swimwear as well). William Rosenthal became President of the Company in 1927. By 1928, the company was selling over 500,000 brassieres a year. By 1929 the demand just for the bra was so substantial that they closed their New York store as Enid Bissett retired from the business and concentrated on their number one product. In 1930 the company name

was changed to the Maiden Form Brassiere Company to be more identified with its principal product.

The firm survived both the Great Depression and by the end of the 1930s, department stores across the country and around the world including Europe and Latin America were selling Maidenform bras.

William Rosenthal focused on design and other advancements including inventing standardized cup sizes, maternity, long-line, full-figure, seamed uplift, nursing, and the "Chansonette bra" also known as the "Bullet Bra." In 1942 he also received a patent for adjustable straps. Ida ran the business, negotiating with unions and introducing assembly-line production. William Rosenthal's sister, Masha Rosenthal Hammer organized an ingenious production line, the first in the women's apparel industry where one seamstress sewed backs, another made straps and a third sewed together the brassiere cups. Ida, a marketing genius, began an aggressive print and radio advertising campaign beginning in the 1930's, making Maidenform the first intimate apparel company to advertise.

The United States entrance into World War II proved challenging for many businesses, including Maidenform, as the fabrics the company relied on were in short supply. Rather than allow material shortages to impact their business, Ida and William utilized their factories to manufacture parachutes, head nets, mosquito bars, mattress covers as well as brassieres for the Women's Army Corps. They also designed a "Pigeon Bra," worn by US paratroopers. Their military "Pigeon Bra," was in actuality a vest that fit over the men's chest and carried a messenger pigeon. When the solider landed, they attached a note to the pigeon, specifying their landing location and other relevant logistical information.

Lup with the nowfamous advertising slogan: "I dreamed I... in my Maidenform bra" campaign, depicting underwear models in a range of unexpected settings (like driving a chariot), which ran successfully 20 for years. This led to sales in 1950 of 12 million bras in 15 styles, each with more than 100 different combinations of size, cups size, color, and material. Between 1949 and 1969 the company

launched 163 "dream sequence" print ads that showed a model wearing only a Maidenform bra above the waist.

After William's death on April 12, 1958, Ida became the company's president and then chairman of the board. In 1963, Rosenthal was also the sole female member of an apparel industry delegation to visit the Soviet Union on a cultural exchange trip for the study of Russian

In 1949, Ida came manufacturing techniques. She continued working until up with the now- she suffered a stroke in 1966, after which she stayed on advertising as honorary chairman of the board until her death from slogan: "I dreamed I... pneumonia in New York City on March 29, 1973.

Beyond her work in leading the company, Rosenthal was involved with a number of Jewish causes, including the Anti-Defamation League and United Jewish Appeal.

After her stroke, the company was then run by her son-in -law Dr. Joseph Coleman. Upon Coleman's death in 1968, Ida's daughter Beatrice Rosenthal Coleman, inherited the multimillion-dollar family company where she had been working since 1938 after graduating from Barnard College, and was the President until her death in 1990. Maidenform was then run by Ida's granddaughter, Elizabeth Coleman until 1997. After going through a long restructuring effort at the end of the 1990s and early 2000s, Maidenform, Inc. became a publicly traded company in July 2005 and on July 24, 2013, was sold to Hainesbrand for \$575 Million dollars. Ida Kahanovich Rosenthal's Maidenform products now sells in over 8,000 department, discount, and outlet stores in the U.S. as well as around the world.

BLATT + BLUE : *SAND STORM* ON THURSDAY, JUNE 9

 \mathbf{B} edouin life in the state of Israel sits behind a screen of incomprehension, obscured by politics, religion, and unfamiliarity. We pay attention to other foreground realities, but Bedouin family life is a world closed off, dimly glimpsed through touristic encounters.

Israeli filmmaker Elite Zexer briefly raises the curtain in a movie she calls *Sand Storm*, but the question is what she succeeds in showing us. Critics have commended her anthropological precision, but wonder what an outsider can truly achieve. The story line focuses on family dynamics and the tug of romantic love in a patriarchal society. It also addresses the reality of plural marriage, especially when it involves younger and older women. In all, it poses thorny questions that challenge audiences to find their own footing.

Participants who would like to screen the film in advance can easily locate it on the Netflix platform. The film won the World Cinema Grand Jury Prize for drama at Sundance and Best Picture from the Israeli Film Academy. The discussion session will take place on Thursday, June 9, at 7:00 p.m.

Blatt + Blue is one of the longest-running projects at the Synagogue during the period of the pandemic. Born in March 2020, it has run without a break for twenty-seven months, spotlighting a diverse and provocative roster of films and television. The series expresses the Synagogue's own commitments to an inclusive and pluralistic vision of the Jewish world. No single endeavor can capture the whole of the Jewish experience. No single institution can exhaust the rich possibilities of Jewish life. Film and television enthusiasts David Blatt and Alice Blue begin each session with a summary of the featured material.
